SHOW REGULATIONS

- The Show entries are restricted to individual members of the Village Society, residents
 and allotment holders, produce grown within the Parish of Burton Bradstock and children
 enrolled at Burton Bradstock School.
- Entries close on WEDNESDAY 9th JULY at 8.00pm and all forms must be accompanied by entry fees (if required). Late entries will be accepted up to 9.30am on the day of the Show at 70p per entry.
- All exhibits must be grown or made by competitors, except for Pot Plants which must have been in the competitors' possession for at least six months and not previously exhibited at the Burton Bradstock Show. Materials for flower arrangements need not necessarily be grown by competitors.
- 4. Preparation facilities at the Show are limited. Exhibits should be prepared in advance as far as possible.
- 5. Exhibitors must stage their entries between **8.00am** and **10.00am** on the day of the Show. Judging will commence at **10.15am**.
- Only one person from a household is allowed to exhibit in the same class, except in the Children's, Floral Arrangements, Handicraft and Photography classes. Each exhibitor must complete a SEPARATE ENTRY FORM.
- 7. Exhibitors are not allowed to make more than one entry in the same class in classes 5-56.
- 8. The judges are empowered to withhold any prizes if entries are too few or if considered unworthy. In all cases the judges' decision shall be final.
- 9. Competitors must provide their own vases, plates, etc. but the Village Society cannot accept responsibility for their loss or breakage.
- 10. Exhibitors are asked to mark entries they wish to keep with NOT FOR SALE notice, available from the organisers. Exhibitors are responsible for removal of such exhibits at 3.15 pm and not before. If not removed, it will be assumed they are available for auction.

The AUCTION will take place at the end of the Show.

NOTE: ANY EXHIBIT "NOT ACCORDING TO SCHEDULE" MAY BE DISQUALIFIED BY THE JUDGES.

- 47. Cycle of a Rose bloom: 1 bud in colour, 1 flower in bloom and 1full blown flower (all the same variety, a single stem of each accepted)
- 48. 2 Stems Floribunda (cluster) Roses
- 49. 5 Pansy blooms
- 50. 1 Clematis bloom
- 51. Vase/bowl of Sweet Peas: 7 stems any variety or varieties.
- 52. 1 Hydrangea bloom
- 53. Vase/bowl of Perennial flower, excluding those in class 52 & 55
- 54. Vase/bowl of annual and/or biennial flowers grown in the open, excluding sweet peas
- 55. Vase/bowl of flowers grown from bulb, tuber, corm or rhizome
- 56. Vase/bowl of three varieties of herbs

HANDICRAFTS

(Created within the last 5 years and not previously shown. More than one item may be exhibited)

- 57. A painting in watercolours. **Any subject**
- 58. A painting or drawing in any other medium. Any subject
- 59. A tapestry/embroidery or cross stitch item from a bought design
- 60. A home-crafted soft item (e.g., embroidery, fabric etc, not named above)
- 61. A home-crafted item in Crochet or Knitting
- 62. A homemade card
- 63. Craft item from naturally gathered materials
- 64. A home-crafted hardware item in wood
- 65. A home-crafted item in metal, pottery, glass etc
- 66. A limerick on "Electric cars" (2 per person max)

PHOTOGRAPHY

(NO more than 3 items per subject may be exhibited)
Max 7x7 ins white card mount. No captions

GENERAL GUIDANCE NOTES

- DO NOT BE PUT OFF SHOWING IF YOUR EXHIBITS ARE NOT IDEAL. AT VILLAGE SHOWS FEW ENTRIES ARE PERFECT, BUT MOST HAVE SOME MERITS WORTH ADDING TO THE DISPLAY.
- 2. Be sure to stage the EXACT NUMBER of specimens asked for in a class.
- 3. For all classes, good presentation may be the deciding factor if competition is close (e.g., lettuce roots wrapped in wet tissue).
- 4. Vegetables should be of good size, but not coarse, and of even size: potatoes ideally not more than 6 oz. each; courgettes 4-6 ins long.
- 5. Pods of peas and broad beans should be full without being over-mature, uniform and with stalks. Runner beans should not show seeds.
- 6. Onions should not be peeled green, should have some stalk which should be bound over or be shown as grown. Beetroot and carrot tops should be trimmed to about 3", and roots left intact.
- 7. Rhubarb should be shown with 3" of leaf blade, and bottom of stick intact.
- 8. Soft fruit should not be too ripe, should have stalks attached and be of even size. Redcurrants and blackcurrants should be shown on strigs.
- In floral classes the following are desirable: freshness, colour, size, cleanliness and uniformity.Select good, unmarked foliage and long strong stems.
- 10. A rose should be half to three-quarters open with a circular outline. In some varieties such as 'National Trust,' marking of the outer petals is natural and not a fault.
- 11. Ideally pot plants should have even growth all round dead blooms and other debris should be removed.
- 12. Exhibitors in the classes 10-17 are advised for reasons of hygiene to make sure that their produce is covered (Only 1 layer of cling film).
- 13. Handicraft exhibitors are requested to indicate clearly if any part of their exhibit is not homemade (e.g., Exhibit does not include frame).
- 14. Jams, jelly, preserves etc. to have **new plain lids** or cellophane and plain labels (classes 5-9). Jars to be clean, full and those with screw lids **not to have waxed seals.**
- 15. Classes **1 to 4, and 17** are open to any child living in the Village or enrolled at the Village School.
